Miskanawah (mis-con-a-wa), Cree for “many paths,” is an Indigenous-led charitable organization offering supportive services grounded in cultural traditions and teachings. As its name implies, this approach guides individuals and families in building pathways to and within the community, strengthening their natural supports and engaging in healthier ways of living. Operating in Calgary for over 36 years, Miskanawah offers programs and services in the areas of family support, youth services, clinical and cultural mental health supports, crisis support, housing support, and cultural and ceremonial offerings.

Guided by the traditional teachings of Wahkotiwin (Cree Natural Law of interconnection and kinship, meaning “everything is related”) our relationships and connections with those we serve are the foundation for the services we provide. Respect and recognition of culture is embedded in the work we do with children, youth, and families.

Our Mission: Guided by Indigenous teachings, Miskanawah offers culturally-based, supportive services to people in the Calgary area as they strengthen their circles of self, family, community, and culture.

Our Vision: Children, youth and families thrive within a culturally responsive community.



Message from Kirby Redwood (CEO)

Miskanawah's 20th Annual Round Dance was a truly remarkable milestone, and our new home at Tsuut'ina Nation Grey Eagle Event Centre created the space needed to honour the growth of this deeply meaningful ceremony. This year's event welcomed over 4500 relatives and reflected something deeper than a celebration—it embodied Wahkotowin; a living expression of community, relationship, and a shared journey.

As Miskanawah continues to host this Round Dance in Mohkinstsis, it has clearly become more than a Miskanawah event. It is a community Round Dance—brought to life through the strength of our relationships with sponsors, partner agencies, donors, and volunteers. Together, with our children, youth and families, we have created a foundation that allows this gathering to thrive and continue to grow in a compelling way.

We extend our deepest gratitude to our Elders, whose guidance, prayers, and leadership continue to ground this gathering in purpose and tradition. Our

gratitude to the drummers and singers, whose gift of song and commitment to traditional protocols guide the Round Dance and carry the spirit of the gathering. The Round Dance remains a powerful reflection of Wahkotowin—our Cree natural law that teaches us how to live in relationship and kinship. It reminds us that our connections extend beyond one another to include our ancestors, our grandmothers and grandfathers, the Creator, and the spirit within each of us.

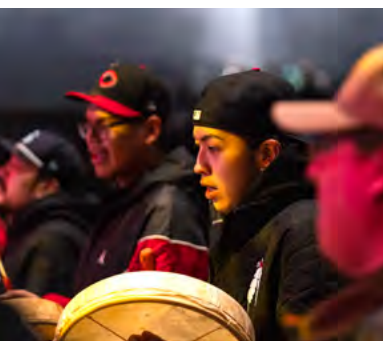
This gathering is not just a moment in time—it is part of an ongoing relational journey that we are honoured to walk together with all of you.

For 20 years, Miskanawah has held an annual Friendship Round Dance — now one of the largest Round Dances in Western Canada.

This gathering is offered as ceremony. It is a space where community comes together to connect, to celebrate, and to be in relationship.

Held during the winter season, the Round Dance brings together Indigenous and non-Indigenous relatives from across Treaty 7 and beyond. Through song, drum, and dance, the space becomes one of connection and community.

As **Cree Elder Patrick Daigneault** shares *"I'm very fortunate, both my wife and I, from when we started to now. It has been a beautiful journey as we continue inviting families and friends from all Nations to celebrate through song, dance, connection, and sharing food."*
